PREPARING FOR A CHURCH MUSIC EVENT

If you have ever been moved by a powerful church music presentation, you may have sat there thinking, “Wow! This must have taken an incredible amount of planning and rehearsing for everything to ‘come to life!’” As a viewer, we are only seeing the tip of the iceberg of what it takes to put together a successful presentation. One of the keys to having a successful music event is planning and preparing effectively. Here are a few helpful ideas to consider when planning for a church music event.

BEGIN PLANNING WELL IN ADVANCE.

Make sure that the event is put on your church calendar and communicate “early on” with your music planning team, music teams, stage crew, and other support staff and volunteers. Let everyone involved know the purpose of your event and how their helping with the event will benefit them, the rest of the church family, and the community.

PRAYERFULLY CHOOSE APPROPRIATE MUSIC REPERTOIRE.

For many music directors, Christmas starts in the summer months, and our preparation for other music events are in like vein. Begin choosing songs that balance challenge and capacity. Keep in mind the capability of yourself and the musicians you lead (talent, rehearsal time limits, and practicality) ,and do not be afraid to stretch yourself. Do not choose a song just because it makes you feel good. Pray about it! Get several opinions and do your best

to reflect your pastor's heart. Find out how long your pastor wants the program to be, so that he has adequate time to speak in the service. If there are activities following the service, keep this in mind too.

STUDY TO KNOW THE PURPOSE OF THE EVENT.

Set aside a time of planning and brainstorming to capture key ideas for your event. Is the primary purpose of your event outreach, a type of vision-casting event, or seasonal in nature? Ask your pastor what his heart and vision are for the event. Define what success is for your event. Ask other music directors for insight and have an open mind to try something fresh. With these key thoughts in the forefront, put together a plan to present to your pastor and/or pastoral team of everything you would like to accomplish in your music event. You may start by presenting your plan to someone close to you, then a few people with whom you will work closely with for the event, and then your pastor. After receiving feedback, polish your plan and present it to your choir, orchestra, drama members (if applicable), and technical support team. It is usually a great idea to present an overview of the presentation to your musicians on the same day that you pass out music and being rehearsing for the event. Prepare outlines and scripts for video and drama ready to be assigned, giving plenty of prep time to those who are creating videos and memorizing lines. Try to spread around the administrative workload of your areas of presentation so that more people can be involved and so that your event can be more organized and well-prepared.

Communicate with your music groups well in advance about the event and how each person can be a part.

Quality attracts. Schedule weekly rehearsals, sectionals, and some additional rehearsals to ensure that your musicians are well-prepared. Remind your musicians to be faithful to attend rehearsals and to practice on their own. It may help for you to record piano and parts of each choir song for your choir members to rehearse at home or while they commute. Make sure that you order an adequate number of books and anthems for your choir and that each

instrumentalist have his own binder of sheet music that he can take home to practice during the week.

ADVERTISE THE EVENT WITHIN YOUR CONGREGATION AND ALSO IN THE COMMUNITY.

The goal of any church music event should ultimately be to point the viewers and participants to Christ. Personal outreach, door-to-door canvassing, scheduled social media posts, commercials, ads, bulletin ads, church announcements, and your church website are several ways that you can advertise your event. Ask local businesses to hang flyers for your event and invite the owners to attend your event. (For some of our music events, we give invitations to local high school band directors to invite their students to attend. We encourage our choir, orchestra, and drama members to invite co-workers, neighbors, and friends to come hear them perform.) Involve the entire church in inviting people to attend your event! They will appreciate the service more if they bring visitors to church for the presentation.

Work with your tech support team to have the right lighting, sound, screens, and materials for advertising.

Prior to the final big rehearsal, give copies of the script to your support staff (lighting, sound, screens, livestream, etc.) and walk through light cues and songs. If you are able to create presets for sound and lights, this is very helpful to maximize efficiency and consistency for the final rehearsal and the presentation. As you prepare brochures, posters, ads, and commercials for advertising, take the time to meet with team members who are helping you in these areas. Come up with a list of benefits of attending the event, so that you can more effectively advertise to your community.

WALK THROUGH YOUR PRESENTATION SEVERAL TIMES PRIOR TO THE PERFORMANCE.

Make sure that your support staff and all musicians are at your final rehearsals prior to the performance. Usually, we have one big rehearsal on the Saturday morning before our music event if it is a weekend event. Videos are prepared and ready for cue, and musicians and drama members are all present. (At LBC, our final rehearsal is usually a dress

rehearsal. We go over each song with instrumentalists, do final sound checks for soloists and groups, and also rehearse with choir and orchestra together. We walk through the entire program once or twice on the final day and include drama and video as applicable to our presentation.)

PRAY FOR GOD'S BLESSING ON YOUR EVENT AND EXPRESS THANKS TO THE LORD AND EVERYONE INVOLVED.

Pray daily for God to bless your event as you prepare. As you pray, ask God to bring to mind anything that you need to do or change. Be sensitive to the Holy Spirit. Have faith that God will use your event to bless Him, to encourage others, and to see the lost come to Christ for salvation. After your presentation, remember to thank those who have sacrificed time and energy to make the event a success! Give God the glory for everything good that happens! 🙏

Reaching Your Community through an effective VBS

Vacation Bible School is always coming! As we plan a new year of ministry, Vacation Bible School is no doubt one of the largest summer events on the church's calendar. But oftentimes, VBS can develop a dry, "we've-done-this-before" mentality among volunteers, and even the children. The church leadership is responsible each year to provide a fresh, new, exciting event that will ground children in the Word of God and attract new families to the church.

Oftentimes in the summer, parents are looking for a fun, affordable event for their kids to enjoy. Groupon recently polled their parent customers, and 58% of them said they wanted summer break to be over after 13 days of their kids being home! "Parents said they were stressed about keeping their kids busy" in those summer months. VBS is a proven event that can reach new families with the Gospel and equip children with the Word of God.

But how can we hold a successful, fresh VBS in the coming year?

FOCUS ON FAMILIES

Not one template or VBS package fits every church, so what are ways that you and your church can help and encourage families for your VBS event? Consider providing a parenting elective each night while the kids are enjoying the events. Serve refreshments, and promote a specific topic that would help parents, something like "Balancing Media in the Home" or "Preparing Your Child for the Teenager Years."

Every parent in your community should want to come and hear how to become a better parent.

How can you make your registration process more user-friendly and impressive to a first time guest? Perhaps provide an online registration on your promotional items to make the registration process quicker when they arrive. Whatever the specifics are that fit your church and schedule, there are always ways that we can make our first impression better each year.

FOCUS ON FUN

To get the parents excited about coming to VBS, the kids need to be excited! Consider counting down each week in your Sunday school classes with small giveaways to build anticipation for the event. Announce specific prizes for each night of VBS so the kids can look forward to the week. Host a costume contest with the theme, or give a grand prize at the end of the week for those who bring the most friends. Create a fun, exciting environment that no other church in your community has. (As a side note, you may want to consider creating your own theme and curriculum to stand out from the usual packages that are offered down the street.)

FOCUS ON FOLLOW UP

Before the event, we need to consider the question: What is a successful VBS? And tailor our follow up accordingly. Obviously a successful VBS changes eternity with the Gospel and changes your church with fresh new faces in



the Sunday services. How can you reach out to those families who come for a night? How can you encourage the children who just got saved to get baptized? How can you see families added to the church because of this event? Maybe have a special Baptism Sunday for those who were saved or have the kids sing in the service on Sunday. Provide a special gift for parents who attend an adult Sunday school class the next Sunday. Encourage your adult ministry leaders to visit the families who came. Sometimes VBS has a tendency to disappear quickly after the last night since most of the volunteers are completely exhausted, so maybe pass on the follow up to a fresh team that can give the energy that is needed. Instead of seeing VBS disappear into the distance, the proper follow up allows the event to accomplish the eternal rewards that matter most.

Vacation Bible School is one of the best ways to reach families in the summer months, but the effort must be well-planned and filled with God's power. Every church is different, but God's power can fill them all if we keep our focus on eternal rewards and seek to lift Christ up to the next generation.

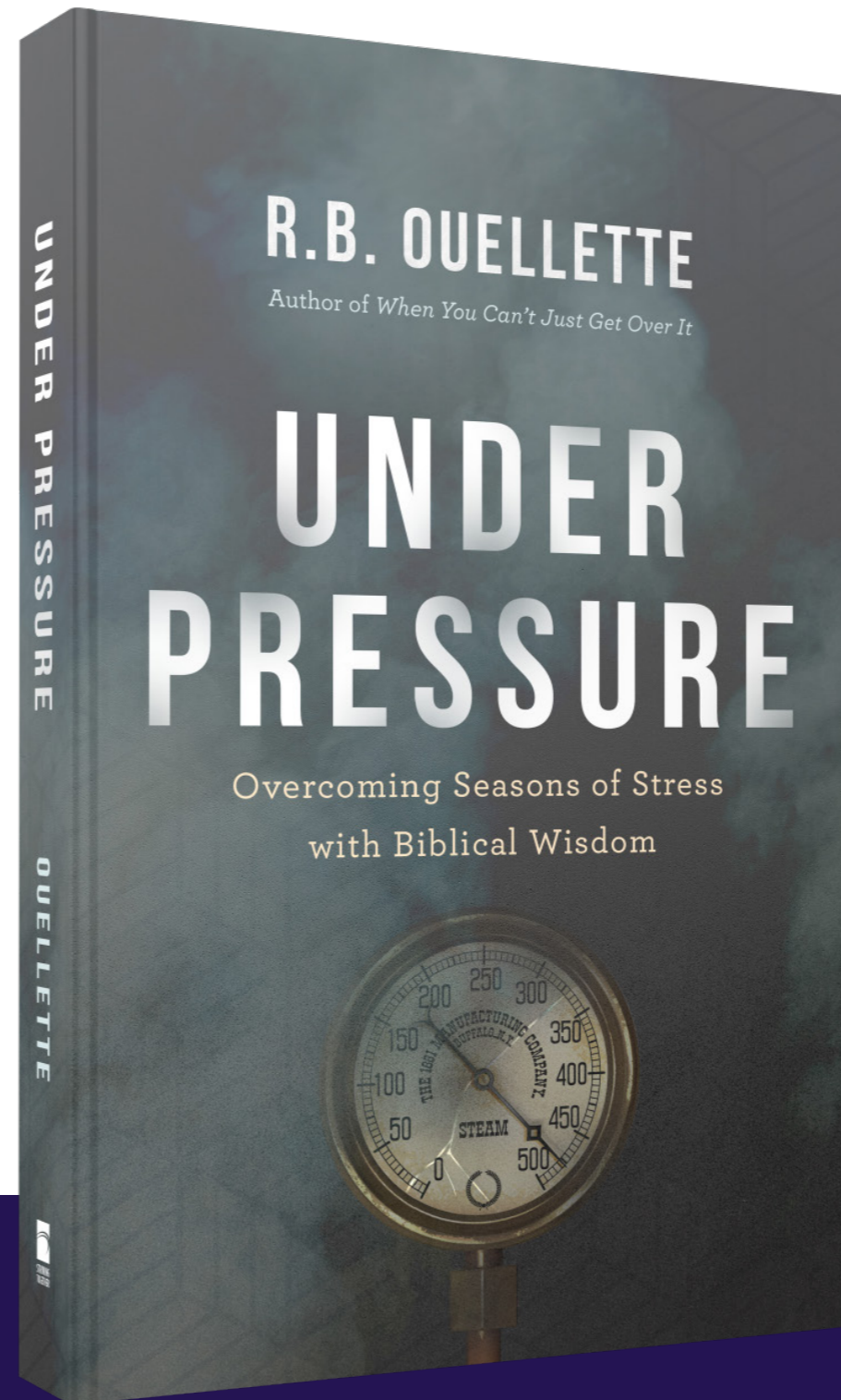
WHEN YOU CAN'T JUST GET OVER

PORTRAITS OF GRACE CURRICULUM

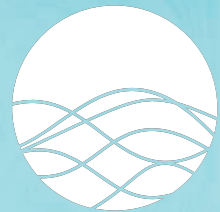

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Trusting God with Our Children

MAKING YOUR HOME A
PEACEFUL PLACE

I have always loved the story of Moses and his family. I love how God used this family to protect their son and save a nation! I am greatly encouraged by the fact that we serve the same God today—a God who still possesses the power and provides the wisdom we need to raise godly children in the ministry. We do not have to lose our children while we attempt to save the world!

Our Christian school hosts a fine arts competition each year. When our oldest daughter, Danielle, was in the eleventh grade, she entered the Bible teaching portion of the competition. Being that she was in other areas of competition that were scheduled around the same time, she was quite frazzled and in a big hurry when she got up to teach. She was teaching on Jochebed in the first person. She started, “Hello, boys and girls, my name is Ichabod.”

Danielle realized by the way my daughter

Kristine and I were laughing that she must have said something wrong. So, a little flustered, she started over, “Hello, boys and girls, my name is Ichabod!” More laughter.

She started over three times before Kristine and I could control our laughter enough to whisper to her that she was saying “Ichabod” instead of “Jochebed.” Suffice it to say, the glory had departed!

We (including Danielle) have laughed over that episode many times. But in all seriousness, I don’t want “Ichabod” written over the door of my home!

If Jochebed kept a journal or a diary, I wonder if it would read something like this: Journal: My heart is overwhelmed. Today Pharaoh ruled that all male Hebrew babies will be placed in the Nile. I wonder if this baby will be a boy. The Lord knows what is ahead, and I will have to trust in Him.

Jochebed trusted God, and though Proverbs 3:5 was not yet written, she obeyed its command: “Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding.” When it comes to parenting, we must trust God and not ourselves.

TRUST GOD WITH CIRCUMSTANCES

The events surrounding Moses’ birth were not an easy pill to swallow for this family. When Moses was born, Jochebed did not throw her arms in the air and say, “Oh well, I trusted God and look

what happened.” She simply chose to respond differently!

If we can’t change the circumstances, then we should change the way we respond to them, just as Jochebed did. Too often, we trust God to only change the circumstance instead of trusting Him to change us in the circumstance. If you are currently in a situation over which you have no control, trust God! Thank Him for the opportunity to prove Him and grow closer to Him.

TRUST GOD WITH YOUR CHILD

Don’t ever forget that, first and foremost, our children belong to the Lord. When we recognize this truth of ownership, it is much easier to trust God with our offspring.

We often think that it is so hard to leave our children in God’s hands, yet I am thankful that I’ve never had to leave my baby in a basket in a crocodile-infested river! We can learn a lot about trust from the example God gives us in Jochebed.

As your children grow, learn to trust the God-given authority in their lives. God knows who your children’s teachers, youth pastors, and principals will be. Even when an authority figure disappoints you or makes a decision differently than you would have preferred, God is still all-knowing. He can work all things together for good, including things related to your children! Support those who have authority over your children, and work

with them in bringing up your children for God.

There will come a time as your children continue to grow when you must “cut the apron strings” and begin to let them go. I can imagine how very difficult it must have been for Jochebed to take her hands off of that basket and to leave Miriam there to watch Moses.

TRUST GOD FOR WISDOM

I pray my life’s verse back to God nearly every day— Jeremiah 33:3, “Call unto me, and I will answer thee, and shew thee great and mighty things, which thou knowest not.” Frequently, I find myself asking God to show me something great and mighty that I don’t know in regards to parenting. I need His wisdom.

Clearly, each child is unique. I have four children, and they are all completely different. Most of the time, I feel like I need four different parenting strategies! So, I regularly ask the Lord to give me the discernment to know how to deal with each one individually. I need wisdom to know when to be quiet, when to keep talking, when to discipline, and when to show grace!

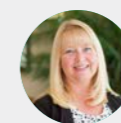
TRUST GOD FOR THE OUTCOME

Jochebed did everything she could do, but ultimately she put Moses in the river and trusted God for the outcome. We know how the story turned out, but Jochebed had to trust God by faith.

We have to learn to “let go and let God.”

I love the illustration of the little boy whose hand was stuck in a very valuable vase. His parents tried everything they could to get his hand out, and nothing worked. After several hours of working to get his hand free, the vase had to be broken. As the vase broke into pieces, freeing his tiny hand, his parents saw for the first time that his fist was tightly clenched. As his little hand opened, everyone saw that he was clinging to a piece of candy! If only he would have let go of the candy, he could have easily taken his hand out of the vase. Perhaps you need to release your grip on the little things in life before God breaks your vase!

How did it turn out for Jochebed? God gave Moses back to her and paid her to nurse and nurture him. God is so awesome! This type of outcome is the product of parental trust. Jochebed had to realize that God was in control, and she had to learn to trust Him, not knowing what the future would hold.
